

2011 Inductees




Phillip Ray Wilson, CAA

Ray Wilson is recognized as one of the founding fathers of the SCAA. Ray was one of the first athletic directors from South Carolina to attend NIAAA Conferences and to become a Certified Athletic Administrator. He was also an outstanding athletic director at Spartanburg High School.




Peter King Dubay, CAA

Pete Dubay is another founding father of the SCAA. He became involved on the national level by attending NIAAA Conferences with Ray Wilson. Pete served on the NIAAA Ways and Means Committee, gave two presentations and became a Certified Athletic Administrator. He served as District AD for Sumter District #17 for 19 years.




H.A. Pete Ayoub

Pete Ayoub's career as a player, coach, athletic director and principal prepared him well for the job of Executive Director of the South Carolina High School League. He knew the importance of the role of each. His encouragement and support of the formation of the SCAA gave the new organization respect from the beginning.



Joe P. Turbeville

Joe Turbeville was an outstanding football coach at Winnsboro, Spring Valley, and Irmo with a 28 year record of 239 wins and 99 losses. As athletic director at Irmo he was first active in state and national Coaches Associations, and then when the SCAA formed, he served as the second President in 1993-1994 and was a key supporter.



Tim F. Touchberry, CAA

Tim Touchberry served 14 years as the athletic director of Fort Dorchester High School. During those years Tim was a member of both the SCAAA and the NIAAA as was involved on the state and national levels. He was an NIAAA delegate for 3 years, SCAAA Board member and president, and was the first SCAAA representative on the South Carolina High School League Executive Committee.
